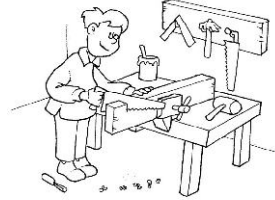


What People Do With Green Jobs

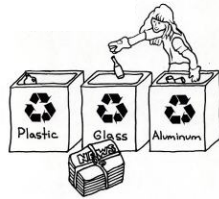
Bus Driver: Drives people from place to place.

Architect: Design homes and big buildings that are heated and cooled by solar or wind power.



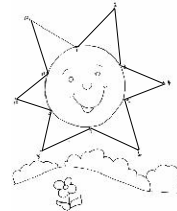
Engineer: Use science to invent new ways to make electricity that gives power to computers and lights.



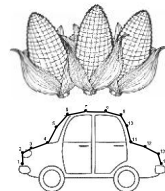
Farmer: Grow organic foods and raise cows, pigs, and chickens and sell them to local grocery stores.



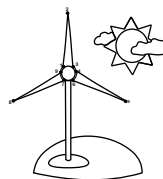
Solar Power: People can use the sun to power their homes and offices with solar panels.
